Topic: Top DIY Home Security Projects

2. Install or Change Your Peephole

Do you have a peephole installed in your front door? What kind of view does it offer you? Is it wide enough for you to get a good look at someone standing on your porch? Inspect your peephole and decide whether or not it needs to be replaced for better home security. If it does, invest in one with an anti-reverse viewing feature so that thieves cannot see inside of your home when peering through it.

3. Strengthen Your Door Security

5. Check Your Detectors

When was the last time you checked the batteries in your smoke, heat, carbon monoxide and fire alarms? Have you tested them lately to make certain they're in good working order? The condition of these alarms can seriously mean the difference between life and death, which makes a maintenance check on all of them one of the best DIY home security projects you can complete...today!

6. Update Your Windows

Entry through a ground-floor window is one of the more common ways criminals gain access to homes. Windows are also some of the more likely culprits in wasted energy resulting in higher utility bills. With this in mind, take a look in your windows and ask yourself if any of them need replacing. If so, head on down to your local hardware store and take a look at some of the DIY options available to you.
