Retro to Rock Roscoe Village Once Again



Music, Food, Drink, Shopping and Fun for All Ages August 11–13

Three stages of radical music. A premium antique car show. Countless vendors with delightful food and goods. A family area with fun and games for all ages. A dunk tank. And all this in the heart of our own neighborhood. This is Retro on Roscoe, Chicago's best street festival, and it returns August 11-13.

As Roscoe Villagers know, Retro is no small-time affair. The party stretches down Roscoe from Damen Claremont, a full seven blocks of fun. It begins at 5 p.m. Friday, August 11 and runs through Sunday night. The music on Retro's three stages is sure to delight, with groups like Sixteen Candles and The Boy Band Night putting nostalgia on full blast.

The festival began in the 1980s as a two-block neighborhood party, according to longtime volunteer Colleen Flood. The name was dreamed up by a local antiques store owner, who wanted to put a unique spin on our own local fest and bring people into what was then a fledgling area.

As fun as Retro is, the best part may be what it does for our community. First, it brings us together: Retro has over 400 volunteers each year, who have a great time helping out. (Sign up at roscoevillage.org; there's a free volunteer party!) Second, revenues from Retro help RVN provide funds to our local schools and put on great events like our Halloween Parade and Garden Walk (see Page 4 for details). Roscoe Village History File

Fifty Years After Closing, Riverview Still Resonates

Today, at the businesses in the vicinity of Roscoe Street and Western Avenue, we buy groceries, order burritos and burgers, shop for toys and pick up prescriptions. There is also a stunning boathouse with river access and a growing educational facility. But 50 years ago, something very different stood in this area, though it was about to be closed forever: Riverview Amusement Park. Once a grove of trees along the Chicago River, the park grew from an early 1900s German sharpshooting club to something much bigger.

It's difficult to imagine now, but Riverview once billed itself as the world's largest amusement park. A famed roller coaster, The Bobs, took riders to the top of an 85-foot incline and then plunged them down, albeit at a modest speed of 38 miles per hour according to Dolores Haugh's Riverview Amusement Park. A beautifully carved carousel took riders round and round. Tram cars on cables transported visitors high over the festivities. Daring visitors floated 200 feet to the ground from a giant tower in what the park called Pair-O-Chutes, according to Chuck Wlodarczyk's Riverview: Gone But Not Forgotten.

Yet after the end of the 1967 season, when over 1.7 million people visited, Riverview's lights went out. The park was facing \$1 million in needed repairs for 1968, Haugh reported. So when the park's owners received an offer for the land for over \$6 million, according to the *Chicago Tribune*, they took it —breaking hearts in the neighborhood that was to become Roscoe Village and beyond. Fifty years later, we still remember.
