## RVN Approves Groundbreaking Security Program

At a meeting on February 13, the board of Roscoe Village Neighbors voted to approve an innovative new security program for our neighborhood that will harness the latest technology to help keep Roscoe Village a safe place to live.

The vote was the first step toward establishing a unique system that will employ cloud-based cameras, strong advocacy, an emergency alert system and enhanced communications with residents. The project represents the twin goals of assisting police in Roscoe Village and discouraging crime from happening in the first place.

"Given the circumstances of urban living, including the decreasing number of police allocated to our neighborhood by City Hall, RVN is committed to helping residents and businesses take action to support law enforcement and deter crime in and around Roscoe Village," said RVN President David Kerber.

The centerpiece of the program will be the installation of up to 27 cameras at 13 locations along Roscoe Street. The 1080p night vision-equipped cameras will feed fully encrypted video footage into a cloud system that can be accessed by Chicago Police Department officials upon request.

The cameras will be accompanied by signage as well as a marketing campaign that spreads the word about the new system. In addition, residents and businesses can purchase cameras for their properties as part of the program or bridge devices that link existing cameras to the new RVN system.

"We anticipate that as participation in the camera program expands and police are able to leverage the modern technology that the program provides, Roscoe Village will become a safer place to live, work and play," said Jason Elster, RVN Neighborhood Watch Committee chair.


### Where Roscoe Village's Street Names Come From

Strolling around the area we know today as Roscoe Village, one begins to wonder: who was Roscoe, anyway? What about Belmont and Addison? Were Seeley and Hoyne the names of people who used to live in the area?

As it turns out, the answers are more complicated than you might think. Using the terrific sourcebook *Streetwise Chicago* by Don Hayner and Tom McNamee, we hereby present some answers:

**Roscoe St.**: Not named for a person, but for the tiny town of Roscoe, Pa. (population 848).

**Belmont Ave.**: Named for an 1861 Civil War battle in Belmont, Mo. led by General Ulysses S. Grant.

**Addison St.:** Named for the English doctor who discovered Addison's Disease.

**Ravenswood Ave.**: Said to be named for ravens flying out of woods that once lined this road.

**Western Ave.**: Once the western border of Chicago. (The border has since moved.)

**Damen Ave.**: Once called Robey Street, then renamed for Father Arnold Damen, who founded St. Ignatius High and Loyola University.

Wolcott Ave.: Dr. Alexander Wolcott married the daughter of Chicago forefather John Kinzie in Chicago's very first wedding.

## Western Ave. Redevelopment Study Released

With demolition of the crumbling overpass on Western Avenue complete, RVN has sought to help answer the question of what should come next for the important roadway.

Through its Zoning and Land Use Committee, commissioned a study to determine how best to steer development along Western with the overpass gone and new opportunities for growth appearing. RVN held a community forum for input from affected neighbors and consulted with nearby business owners and local officials to help inform the study's conclusions.

The resulting document provides a comprehensive overview of Western Avenue development at present along with recommendations for future land use in the area. The study was conducted by the Lakota Group and Goodwin Williams Group; read it at https://goo.gl/rrDdnL.

## City Begins Pedestrian Chicago River Bridge

This fall, the City of Chicago broke ground on a bridge and pedestrian walkway that may change the way Roscoe Villagers view and use the Chicago River. Dubbed "312 RiverRun," the project is poised to connect parks along the riverfront from Horner Park to our own Clark Park. As a first step, the City is building the Riverview Bridge, which will rise 18 feet above the river and stretch for over 1.000 feet between Belmont Avenue and Addison Street. Once the bridge is complete—which planners claim will be by the end of 2018—cyclists and runners who enjoy traversing Clark Park will have a new, scenic option for recreation. Future phases of 312 RiverRun will extend pedestrian access along the river linking California and Horner parks.





**Seeley Ave.**: Once called Tyson Ave., Seeley was renamed for Adm. Amos Seeley, who in 1879 developed land around Seeley near Madison St.

Hoyne Ave.: Named for Thomas Hoyne, onetime U.S. Attorney who elected was Chicago mayor—but only for three months. Hoyne bested then-lawyer Abraham Lincoln in an 1853 criminal case against a mail thief.

**Hamilton Ave.**: Thought to be named for Richard Hamilton, most likely the first lawyer in Chicago back in 1831. But it may have been named for first U.S. Treasury and musical inspiration Secretary Alexander Hamilton instead.

Leavitt St.: David Leavitt was a New York banker who also served as trustee for the Illinois and Michigan Canal, saving the vital waterway connecting the Mississippi to the Great Lakes ruin before financial construction was complete.

**Bell Ave.**: Named either for George Bell, lieutenant of a regiment of Illinois Volunteers in 1861, or Alexander Graham Bell, telephone inventor North Center.

was also a trustee of the Illinois zombie priest.

**Claremont Ave.**: Although spelled slightly differently, this road was named for the first steamboat to be in public service: Robert Fulton's Clermont, which first traveled up the Hudson River in New York in 1807.

Eddy St.: Named for D.C. Eddy, lawyer and banker who according to the Chicago History Museum laid out Lake View subdivision in 1888.

Cornelia Ave.: Named for Cornelia Dver. whose grandfather subdivided this land and also served as Chicago mayor.

**Newport Ave.**: Once called St. Elmo St., Newport was named for the town of Newport, R.I.

Henderson St.: Likely named for A.H. Henderson, a developer who laid out the map of an area including this street closer to Lake Michigan.

School St.: There is a school on School St., though it's not in Roscoe Village; it's Hawthorne Scholastic Academy at School and Clifton, for which this road was named.

Melrose St.: Named for the namesake of Bell Elementary in Melrose Abbey in Scotland, a Gothic abbey built in 1146 and Oakley Ave.: Charles Oakley rumored to be home to a roving
